Rick Westbrook, Office Administrator of First E, has received several significant honors this year. Georgia Voice, which holds the 2011 "Best of Atlanta" Awards, granted Rick the designation of "Best Outside the Perimeter Activist". Two organizations founded by Rick also won Best of Atlanta awards. The Flaming Sugarbaker Sisters were named as "Local Icon", and The East Point Possum Show won for "Best Charity Event". Fenuxe Magazine named Rick on their list of the fifty most prominent and influential members of Atlanta's LGBT community. Rick also won the Jungle's Dragnique 2, a drag competition modeled on



TV's "reality" shows. And, last, but certainly not least, Rick will be one of Atlanta Pride's Grand Marshals this month. I sat down with Rick to talk about his honors and plans:

The First E Children's Program underwent an exciting expansion this summer when we sought out and hired a new Childcare Provider for our very youngest. A young woman, partner and mother in our midst, Aurelia Kime, was selected for the position of caring for children aged 6 months through 4 years during our weekly Celebrations of Life. Aurelia co-supervises all of the children who come downstairs and provides alternate activities for the 0.5-4 year olds while our Religious Educator, Stephanie Murphy, delivers a program with our school aged children. Currently, the older children are studying the UU Principles through the children's literature of Dr. Seuss.

All of the children benefit from having a second adult present with them. As a congregation, we are better prepared to meet the needs of families by having an additional Childcare Provider. For this opportunity to expand, the Education Guild and First E Parents' Group are grateful to the support of our entire First E community.

We are a conscious choice community. We provide a warm welcome for those seeking community, a secure sanctuary for those seeking safe harbor, and acceptance of individual beliefs for those seeking spiritual growth.

"You're coming to my town, I'm coming to you." I called friends who called their friends, reached out to other organizers, and there were 200 protesters and [only] 10 people from the NOM tour. When I heard that one of **Rick Westbrook Honored Continued from Page 1** the NOM organizers realized that he was on the wrong side of this issue, and that his stop in Atlanta was the turning point, I cried.

When I entered the Dragnique contest, it was me and 8 others half my age. On the final day, I was given a song to perform that included the N-word. I told the crowd that I refused to participate in a song with the N-word and they went wild. Then I was told to perform "Bohemian Rhapsody," which is a male song. I made it into a lesson on AIDS. First I simulated sex (in a clean way), next held up a cocktail glass full of pills, then held up a sign with a positive symbol and my partner, John, held up a negative sign. The crowd roared its approval.

How long have you been HIV positive? Going on nineteen years. I've been with John for eighteen years and he's remained negative. I have to take twelve pills a day, some for depression, some for muscular aches, and more to treat other symptoms.

Tell me about your other job with Positive Impact. I get to talk to men about their sex lives! And about playing safe. I hand out condoms and talk about safe sex in gay bars, sex clubs, adult entertainment venues, and homeless youths living under bridges. I find the largest resistance coming from men my age, because they feel like they've lived without getting HIV this long. Young men don't know what AIDS used to be like when people had lesions, contracted TB or pneumonia, aged quickly, and faced a death sentence. They think, "If I get it, I'll just take a pill every day."

What are you plans for the First E Community Garden? Next year I'm starting earlier. We're going to get chickens, and I hope to set up a watering system with rain barrels and a drip line.

Who inspires you? My parents. They taught me to never start a fight, but be sure to finish one. I'm not violent, but if anyone comes after my friends or my hippies or young people, I'm fighting back. My other inspiration is a good friend who helped start the East Point Possums. He died of AIDS, and he made me promise to keep the Possums Show going.

How did the Possum Show get its name? Our first drag show was part of a larger benefit in Atlanta. When we were introduced, the MC said that we were from south of the city, some East Point possums. "They ain't pretty and they only come out at night." This year we raised \$11,000 for Positive Impact's M.I.S.T.E.R. (Men's Information, Services, Testing, Empowerment and Resources) project and Atlanta Pride.

What's next? My push in 2012 will be with [homeless] kids. I estimate there are 2,000 to 4,000 homeless queer youth in Atlanta. I'm looking for a triage center for homeless LGBT youth, where people will be willing to take them in until they can go to a program. Covenant House provides a good program for young people, as does Stand Up for Kids. Trans youth have the hardest time because shelters don't know where to put them and they are at greater risk of sexual assault and violence.

Anything else you want to tell us? For Pride, the Sisters' float will be about AIDS education. As Grand Marshal, I won't be riding with them. They'll be riding in a truck with posters of friend or foe. Foes include Nathan Deal, Michelle Bachmann, Ronald Reagan, Jerry Falwell, Fred Phelps, and Anita Bryant. Friends will include Audre Lorde, Randy Shilts, Elizabeth Taylor, Keith Haring, Judy Shepard, and Cleve Jones. They'll be handing out condoms and the truck will also have timeline of AIDS, because if we don't remember our history, we're doomed to repeat it.

Founded in 1937 as an alternative to the American Bar Association (in protest of the ABA's then policy of excluding blacks and Jews from membership), the National Lawyer's Guild (NLG) is a national non-profit legal and political organization of lawyers, legal workers, law students and jailhouse lawyers. It represents progressive political movements, using the law to protect human rights above property interests and to attain social justice.

At the beginning of April, the Guild held its 2011 Southern Regional in Asheville, NC. Many topics were addressed, including **Crimmigration** – or the criminalization of immigrants through anti-immigrant legislation, and **the Civil Right to Counsel**, which our Constitution guarantees in **criminal** proceedings, and this movement argues poor people should be granted lawyers to help with civil litigation as well. A particular topic of interest was **Resegregation** – which is a current issue of continuing racial (in)justice.

This last issue touches on both the re-segregation of public schools and the increasing emphasis on **policing** of those schools leading to an acceleration of what's become known as the "school to prison pipeline". Katherine Kim, with the ACLU's National Legal Department's Racial Justice Program, stated:

"K-12 public schools across the country have begun to deploy law enforcement agents on school grounds in growing numbers. Although there are no current national figures for the number of such officers, in 2004, 60% of high school teachers reported armed police officers stationed on school grounds, and in 2005, almost 70% of public school students ages 12 to 18 reported that police officers or security guards patrol their hallways. Frequently referred to as "School Resource Officers" or SROs, these agents are often sworn police officers employed by the local police department and assigned to patrol public school hallways full-time."

Under-resourced public schools are one of the primary gateways to the "school to prison pipeline". Other entry points: failure to provide for special needs students; setting up disciplinary "alternative schools"; sending students to juvenile or criminal courts; racial, and other, discrimination by school staff and administration; draconian discipline (e.g. zero tolerance policies with mandatory suspension – the suspension rate in general has doubled over the past 30 years); and criminalizing school discipline. All of this leads to higher drop-out rates. A HS drop-out is 3-1/2 times more likely to end up in prison. 83% of the prison population in the U.S. didn't graduate HS.

Lest you think that these students being sent before judges must have done some pretty egregious crimes or committed violent acts, here are a few examples (from ACLU cases) of what led to such outcomes:

1. throwing water balloons
2. American Indian student hitting a white student at recess – the white student had scratched his friend earlier in the day and not been disciplined
3. text messaging too much
4. wearing a "Native Pride" t-shirt (American Indian student)
5. having rap lyrics in a locker; wearing certain handkerchiefs in a pocket; drawing a picture of a coyote and a peace pipe (all seen as "gang-related activity")
6. And my favorite: refusal to take a nap!

I'm not a parent, but I'm outraged at hearing what some school districts are doing. If any of you (or family or friends you know with kids in public schools), hear of such actions by a school against its students, please call me and I'll put you in touch with NLG or ACLU attorneys.

The downturn in the economy has resulted in hard times for most people, but for some, these times

have turned critical. Jobs are scarce and helping organizations are overwhelmed. Some of those in crisis are among us at First E. It can be hard to stand up on Sunday during personal announcements and share the anxiety and level of despair that desperate finances have brought on. But some have made contact with the membership guild and/or minister to request assistance. Recipients are kept confidential.

You can help by making a donation to the Ministers Discretionary Fund. This has never been a large fund and monies given out are small amounts for crisis situations requiring immediate help --food, transportation and occasionally housing. Any amount you give will be greatly appreciated and issued with great care.

Another way to help those in crisis is to bring in some non-perishable food to put in the barrel at the front of the stage for the Atlanta Community Food Bank. While doing shopping for yourself, look for specials on canned goods or boxed goods. Bring in a bag of food or one can; everything is a help. The Food Bank is called to come do a pick up when the barrel is full. It's been some time since the last pick up. Let's see how quickly we can bring the barrel to full!!

Day of the Dead / Dia de los Muertos

First E will celebrate our annual Day of the Dead on October 30. We will create an ofrenda (an altar) from pictures of those loved ones we have lost along with food, drink, and objects that they loved in life. Candles and flowers are also welcome. Marigolds and cockscomb are traditionally used because of their intense color tones. (Bring any of these you may have.)

We have patterned our celebration after the festival held in Mexico on Nov 1st and 2nd, a time to welcome the souls of the dead who return for a few hours to enjoy the pleasures they knew in life. In Mexico, families clean and decorate the grave sites. In some areas, families spend the night at the cemetery remembering their passed loved ones, enjoying the company of the living.

Jill Ruhlman, who brought this celebration to First E, wrote the following about Day of the Dead, "This yearly celebration gives us time to honor the souls that touched our lives and helps us to give space to remembering we are all passing through this space and no matter how rich or poor we will all pass on. This Mexican fiesta helps us to come face to face with one of the great mysteries that we share today with people throughout time. These words from an Aztec poem were written before Columbus came to the new world and are just as meaningful today as they were hundreds of years ago:

Are flowers carried to the kingdom of death?
 Is it true that we go, is it true that we go!
 Where do we go? Where do we go?
 Are we dead there or do we still live?
 Do we exist there again?"

NEW CHALICE LIGHTER CALL **for Georgia Mountains Unitarian Universalist Congregation!** Dahlonega, Georgia

First E recently received \$7,000 from the Mid-South District's Chalice Lighter Fund to help fund our ramp/lift that is in process. Now there is a new Chalice Lighter Call that goes out to assist the [Georgia Mountains Unitarian Universalist Church](#) of Dahlonega, GA and you can [Enroll as a Chalice Lighter](#) to help out another congregation.

The GA Mountains UU Church was founded in 1993, and in 1997 moved into its current building on the corner of South Park Street and Morrison Moore Parkway. The building was originally a church and then a business before becoming their sanctuary. They are seeking a grant to help make their sanctuary safe and more energy efficient so that their bills will be more affordable by replacing broken, single pane windows. This will also help them move forward in their Green Sanctuary application. The cost to replace all windows upstairs and down will be \$8,724.

The original church was built by an Assembly of God Congregation with the pastor's family living in the ground floor. Since purchasing the building, GMUUC has redone the front of the building to shore up the foundation, added a welcoming front porch and replaced the two windows in that section. They are presently working on refurbishing the ground floor for Children's RE which will include window replacement at that level.
